PICNIC AT THE PALACE

Join us for a Sunday afternoon picnic in the field behind Otford Palace on Sunday 1st August, next month. We're starting at 2.30pm. You just bring your rug and your chairs, some sandwiches and a thermos, and fingers crossed, we will have a beautiful sunny afternoon.

Every resident of the village (because in our first year everyone is an Otford Society member of course) is welcome for this afternoon event. Nothing complicated. No organised games. No piped music. Simply a lovely way to enjoy the afternoon with your family and friends. In fact invite some others along to join you.

If the little ones want to dress up as a Palace Princess or a Palace Knight, then I'm sure there will be prizes.

If you approach the palace from the Green. Then walk to the left, beside the gatehouse building, and you'step straight into the field (once the biggest courtyard in Europe). We'll have notices up and you'll see our banner.

With our model on display, you can even see how this place looked in 1516 when it was first built; try and name the toy tiger or see how good your family are at solving the giant Otford Labyrinth – or simply sit yourself down with an ice cream (if we can organise one). It will be just a lovely afternoon out for everyone and some happy memories too, we hope.

THE OTFORD LABYRINTH

This is the idea from committee member, Phil Clucas. The plan is to design a giant labyrinth in the Courtyard Field of the Palace. Otford families and our many visitors can then enjoy walking the convoluted pathway of the three-centuries-old spiral design. Phil, initially, is cutting the labyrinth in the grass of the field. If the design works, as well it should, then with the support of the Archbishop's Palace Conservation Trust, we hope Historic England will permit us to make it more permanent. Whether this is by outlining its trails with a low box hedge, or simply establishing the pathway with flag-stones or gravel is yet to be decided. Either way, the Otford Society hope to create a permanent feature that fascinated previous Tudor owners of the Palace as much as it will modern-day 'pilgrims'.

CYCLING WITH THE FAMILY

We are all well aware of the health benefits of cycling as well as the sheer fun of cycling together as a family. For that reason, the Otford Society is actively supporting the Sevenoaks-to-Otford Cycle Scheme (STOCS) which aims to provide a safe cycling route between the village and Sevenoaks. It's hoped that this could be used by families, shoppers, commuters, tourists and even older children on their journey to school. What a joy to be able to safely cycle right into the town!

Sevenoaks District Council is supporting a bid for funding via Kent County Council to the Department for Transport's *Active Travel Fund*. Whilst there are still many barriers to be overcome, if the funding bid is successful, this plan has a good chance to succeed. This is being actively led by our committee member, Simon Featherstone, who has also recently become vice-chairman of our Parish Council.

Simon is also working on our behalf with the Darent Valley Landscape Partnership to explore the practicalities of at last developing the Darent Valley Path as a safe, joint cycle and pedestrian route all the way from Westerham to Dartford. What a trip that could be! We wish him well..

THE ANNUAL SOCIETY GARDEN PARTY

The Otford Society garden party is an institution that has taken place over very many years since the Society's formation. Your new committee have no intention of breaking with this tradition. THE RAILWAY BRIDGE. TELL US YOUR VIEWS

By way of information, the Inquiry on the proposal by Network Rail to close the footpath/level crossing from Tudor Drive and replace it with a 62 step footbridge starts on Monday 26th July. Despite requests by the Parish Council and the Otford Society for the Inquiry to be held in public (when covid restrictions allowed), the Planning Inspectorate are demanding that it beheld via a digital link only!

Given our concerns over this proposed closure, we have been asked to address the enquiry representing the views of our membership. We have therefore emailed all those members who have supplied us with their email addresses in order to assess a common view before we do so. We want to ensure that what we say has the backing of the majority of our members,

Our concern is that, should the enquiry approve the closure of the level crossing, there is a possibility that Network Rail may not then replace it with a footbridge as they have previously suggested. This has apparently been the case elsewhere. If this were so, the serious inconvenience it will cause to all those of our community who live to the east of the railway, will be significant. So if you receive an email from us asking your views, or wish to express them whether or not you have email contact with us, please do respond as soon as possible.

We have a great Management committee and frankly, we are a pretty inventive lot. But we are always looking for new volunteers and exciting ideas for future projects.
