

Watching the world creeping closer

Part of our remit at the Otford Society is to do all we can to help protect our community and that includes encroachment by new housing schemes and unwanted development.

As many of you know, Fort Halstead, now the MOD have left, is likely to become a new development area for 700 new homes. This may not affect us directly you may think, until you realise that all those new families are being referred to the Otford Medical Practice as their preferred GP. It is not our place to comment upon the medical practicalities of this decision but the additional traffic that it will generate, both through Otford and on to Kemsing is certainly of concern.

Now plans for the Quarry development, to the east of the Vestry Estate are under discussion. This proposes an added 800 new units being built on the old Greatness Farm site next to the Tarmac landfill (on land to the south of the railway as the line bends round towards Maidstone).

Apart from the effect its traffic will have upon Kemsing and Seal, our concerns are for the effect upon the Bat and Ball intersection. A new roundabout simply will not suffice to overcome the congestion. All we can assure members is that, with your Parish Council and District Council members, we are monitoring and commenting on these proposals and will do our utmost to protect Otford from added traffic congestion.

Offering a helping hand

It is not part of our objectives to act as any form of Social Welfare for our community. However that doesn't stop us offering a helping hand when it is needed.

With incomes ever tighter and the price of fuel and goods rising alarmingly, there are families in our community who are finding life a big struggle. It is our hope and intention to work in future with established charities in doing what we can to alleviate that strain that some of our local families are feeling. We certainly don't want any children and their families missing out on Christmas this year.

The King's Coronation

Our new King has his coronation on Saturday 6th May. And Otford will have its great Coronation Celebration two days later, on Monday 8th May. It's been declared a public holiday (as well as the 1st May).

We'll probably be out on the Green again along with the beer tent, ice creams and hog-roast, all in full Coronation regalia. We hope all the popular singers and bands from last year's picnic will be there again and the weather will, of course, be perfect!

So put it in your diary. The 8th May. Get the family together, and the picnic rugs and chairs and join us for our Great Otford Coronation celebration.

The Otford Fete





Meanwhile, as part of this transformation, craft-designer Jenny Kelly has led on the pop-up craft project which takes place in the ticket hall. On the second Thursday of every month she has organised for local crafters, artists and photographers to show their work at the station. These regular little shows of local talent reward any visit with a great sense of pride and admiration for local creativity. Be sure to make a visit.
